About this Service

Eastertide

Easter is the highest holiday of the Christian year—a celebration of the event that defines our Church: the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, fulfilling the scriptural foretelling of the Messiah. Like spring itself, the Paschal feast brings the promise of new life. The Easter Season, also known as Eastertide, will continue for 50 days until Pentecost, which occurs on June 5 this year.

After weeks of preparation and reflection, more joyful elements return to the liturgy. The confession is dormant throughout this jubilant season. Gloria, a song of praise, replaces the Kyrie, a supplication for mercy; and the word alleluia ("Praise the Lord")—which has not been spoken during the past 40 days of Lent—is proclaimed enthusiastically, and will remain in acclamations, hymns, and dismissals throughout Eastertide.

Please be advised that if you attend the physical church service you must wear a mask. This is required by the Diocese of New Jersey

Grace and peace to all the members of the Episcopal Diocese of New Jersey.

The <u>COVID-19 Reentering</u>, <u>Reopening</u>, <u>Reimagining</u> (<u>RR</u>) <u>Task Force</u> called by Bishop Stokes has developed guidelines and advice as our church buildings move through the phases of re-opening. The Task Force issued its initial report on June 5, 2020. That report has now been replaced by a <u>new one dated March 18, 2022.</u>

"I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." —John 13:34-35

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the conditions affecting our worship and work as congregations and as disciples of Christ have changed many times since March 2020, and will continue to change. What does not change, and cannot change, is our primary commitment to love one another as Jesus has loved us. That commitment must be an active one on the part of congregations and individuals, and must adapt to the unique situation of each congregation.

Congregations are encouraged to plan for the protective measures and the policies and freedoms that best suit the needs, risks, and unique situation of their specific community; with love for one another and our community at the center of that planning. No congregation is required to conform to the standards of a different congregation or congregations.

This set of guidance from the Reentering, Reopening, and Reimagining (RRR) Task Force is meant to help congregations, their leaders and members, care for one another and plan to gather and work together with appropriate care and freedom as the pandemic continues to evolve. In addition, the Task Force or the Bishop may issue specific directives or guidance that temporarily supersede the guidance and permissions in this document.

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. [...] The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you', nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you'. [...] God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.



When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. ³⁸Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." ³⁹So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. ⁴⁰Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. ⁴¹He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. ⁴²This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. ⁴³Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.



He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.







May 8, 2022 – Easter 4 (C) Week 3: Reflections on the Resurrection

During the Easter season, Sermons That Work is pleased to present reflections from bishops of The Episcopal Church on the resurrection of our Lord. Check back each week for a brief exploration of how Jesus Christ's rising from the grave changes everything. Jesus said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe" (John 20:27).

Jesus' hands, feet, and side remain wounded as he appears to his first followers after his resurrection. He has risen from the dead yet remains wounded. What is the Holy Trinity telling us with this not insignificant detail? This is Jesus, after all, who made lepers clean, gave hearing to a man born deaf, and sight to one born blind. Jesus fed the multitudes, walked on water, calmed the storm, and raised the dead. Jesus healed the centurion's servant without even stepping foot in his yard. Jesus, who in so many ways showed that his power was unlimited, does not heal himself.

Jesus comes back still bearing humanity's marks on his flesh. If Jesus rose healed over, nice and neat, we could be tempted to see the cross as less significant. We could decide that suffering, particularly suffering and sacrifice for others, holds no meaning for us. Instead, we see how far the compassion of the Holy Trinity extends. Compassion means "suffering with." Jesus had compassion for Thomas whose doubts had overtaken his faith. Jesus offers Thomas the proof the disciple needs to understand that, though Jesus died, he has truly risen from the grave.

For me, the most astounding part of these wounds is that it reveals Jesus as vulnerable. The literal meaning of vulnerable is "able to be wounded." God the Son was fully human as well as fully divine, and so able to be wounded. He was wounded by humans for the sake of humanity. This matters to our day-to-day lives, as we are called to live our bodily, daily existence, transformed by the Christ who is present with us in our suffering and loss. Jesus, who felt the pain of what humans did to him, knows suffering. Jesus, who experienced abandonment on the cross, knows that pain – and yet will never abandon you.

To love is to make oneself vulnerable. Jesus' vulnerability shows the depths of God's love for all humanity. The Holy Trinity could have remained outside of creation as a righteous judge. Instead, God entered the creation in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. A necessary part of being one of us is emotional and physical vulnerability. People could and did reject him and put him to death. Yet Jesus did not give up on loving us, even when the cost of that love was death on a cross. Whatever you are facing, you have alongside and within you a loving God who understands fully. Ask Jesus to touch your wounded life with his hands that still bear the marks of what we humans did and yet remain open, reaching out with love and healing.

PENNSYLVANIA BISHOP REVEALS COVID-19 OUTBREAK AMONG ATTENDEES OF CLERGY CONFERENCE By David Paulsen Posted May 4, 2022

[Episcopal News Service] At least 41 clergy members in the Diocese of Pennsylvania tested positive for COVID-19 after attending a clergy conference last week, Bishop Daniel Gutiérrez revealed May 3 in a letter to the Philadelphia-based diocese.

The <u>in-person conference was held April 25-27</u> in Cape May, New Jersey, and about 150 clergy members attended, including the bishop. It was the first such conference held by the diocese since the start of the pandemic in March 2020, Gutiérrez said. "It was a joyous time with a vibrant guest speaker," Gutiérrez

"It was a joyous time with a vibrant guest speaker," Gutiérrez said. "Our conference planning committee took great steps to ensure that safety precautions were in place for those attending the conference. Participants were required to be vaccinated and boosted to attend and were encouraged to mask if they so chose." On April 28, four attendees informed the diocese they had

On April 28, four attendees informed the diocese they had tested positive for the coronavirus. The diocese responded by informing all attendees that they may have been exposed, and more clergy reported testing positive. "I have called each person who notified me of a positive test

"I have called each person who notified me of a positive test and, thankfully, all have reported mild symptoms, with none requiring hospitalization," Gutiérrez said. "Affected clergy were instructed not to lead worship this past Sunday and we provided support for their congregation where needed." Gutiérrez noted that the outbreak mirrors trends in the region, where coronavirus cases are increasing. The diocese's 135 churches are located in the southeast corner of the state. Despite an <u>uptick in cases there over the past month</u>, hospitalizations and deaths have remained low and are far fewer the numbers seen nationwide during the winter surge in COVID-19 related to the omicron variant.

"As the virus becomes more endemic, we will continue to see cases occur even when protocols are in place and people are up to date on vaccines," Gutiérrez said. "As there are new medical developments we will continue to update our protocols and support our churches so that we may continue to worship and gather as safely as possible.

"Unfortunately, this disease is going to be with us for a while. United in Jesus Christ, as one people and one diocese we will continue to rise to the challenge."

News of the outbreak among Pennsylvania clergy comes after at least four members of Executive Council, including the Rev. Gay Clark Jennings, president of the House of Deputies, tested positive for the coronavirus following the governing body's April 20-23 meeting in San Juan, Puerto Rico. All members attending the Executive Council meeting were required to show proof of vaccination when registering. A similar requirement will be in place for bishops, deputies and all others attending the 80th General Convention from July 7-14 in Baltimore, Maryland, and additional precautions are under consideration.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL CALLS SPECIAL MEETING AS GENERAL CONVENTION COVID-19 RISK RAISES ANXIETY

[Episcopal News Service] Episcopal Church leaders, facing increasing concerns about the risk of COVID-19 outbreaks at the 80th General Convention, will convene a special meeting of Executive Council on May 11 to discuss safety precautions for this summer's churchwide gathering.

Executive Council will meet at 9 a.m. Eastern May 11 on Zoom, according to information <u>shared online May 5 by the</u> <u>House of Deputies</u>. The special meeting was called, under a rarely used provision in the church's Canons, by six members of Executive Council, including the chairs of the governing body's four standing committees.

The purpose will be to discuss "public health and pastoral protocols and procedures that should be in place for General Convention attendees and the relative merits of meeting in Baltimore," according to the House of Deputies' post. The 80th General Convention initially had been scheduled for 2021 but was postponed for a year because of the pandemic.

It now is set to <u>take place July 7-14 in Baltimore, Maryland</u>. Masks and proof of vaccination will be required of all

attendees, and church leaders continue to consider additional precautions as necessary.

Some of those who are scheduled to attend General Convention, however, have expressed apprehension in recent weeks over the plan to meet in person at such a large churchwide gathering, which also serves as the meeting of the church's primary governing body.

This week, in a <u>blog post shared widely</u> on Twitter, the Rev. Megan Castellan, a <u>priest in Ithaca, New York</u>, argued that holding an in-person General Convention would be "a huge mistake."

"It is not like our church is unaware of the pandemic; I believe the leadership is trying to address it while also trying to convene Convention. The problems, though, are legion, and do not disappear because of those good intentions," wrote Castellan, who serves as a deputy for the Diocese of Central New York. "We need to cancel Convention. Until we

The Rev. Scott Gunn, a deputy for the Diocese of Southern Ohio and <u>executive director of Forward Movement</u>, shared Castellan's blog post and echoed her concerns.

– Nurya Love Parish (@nurya) May 4, 2022 Several members of Executive Council raised their own concerns during their April 20-23 meeting in San Juan, Puerto Rico, about the propriety of holding General Convention in person at a time when the coronavirus, though greatly diminished from its winter peak, is <u>still</u> <u>circulating widely</u>. In the past month, <u>new subvariants have</u> <u>begun pushing case counts in higher</u> in the United States, though hospitalizations and fatalities have remained relatively low. Some council members also noted the dangers of long COVID and the increased risk to older people and those with underlying health conditions.

The Rev. Gay Clark Jennings, president of the House of Deputies, responded at that time by saying the General Convention Office continued to prepare for a range of public health scenarios while planning for the in-person gathering in Baltimore. The Joint Standing Committee on Planning and Arrangement, meanwhile, is expected soon to release a set of guiding principles it will follow in responding to the evolving coronavirus threat. The church's presiding officer also have met with public health experts on additional risk mitigation steps, and Executive Council approved \$50,000 for a public health expert to advise Jennings on policies and procedures.

The potential risks of a large in-person gathering were underscored when at least eight people, including Jennings, tested positive for COVID-19 <u>after attending the Executive</u> <u>Council</u>. About 60 council members, staff and visitors had attended the meeting in San Juan, while some of the council's 40 voting members attended online. Separately, news that at least 41 people in the Diocese of Pennsylvania tested positive for the virus after attending a clergy conference last week has fueled additional anxiety among church leaders over COVID-19 risks. The Pennsylvania clergy reported mild symptoms, and none were hospitalized, according to a <u>letter to the diocese from Bishop</u> <u>Daniel Gutiérrez</u>.

As a bicameral governing body, General Convention splits its authority between the House of Bishops and House of Deputies. General Convention typically meets in a different city every three years and is a hub for legislative activity, networking and fellowship. Hundreds of bishops and deputies attend, as well as thousands of church staff members, representatives of church-affiliated organizations, vendors and observers.

The one-year postponement has allowed committees to hold some meetings and hearings online for the first time; the <u>hearings are now ongoing</u>. Holding hearings online also has helped the church achieve its goal of reducing the triennial gathering's <u>duration from 10 to eight days</u>.

"It's been a privilege to get to know her these past few months; I have every expectation that the Diocese of Utah will thrive from her strong spiritual presence and serious leadership skills. The experience of running for bishop is unlike any other ministry experience I've ever had. I am grateful to all who have been so supportive through a grueling process. Most of all, I'm glad to be able to move full-speed back into my wonderful job here in New Jersey, with all of its extraordinary people."

AN ANNOUNCEMENT FROM THE BISHOP: THE REV. JOANNE IZZO BEGINS HER MINISTRY AS INTERIM CANON TO THE ORDINARY AND TRANSITION'S OFFICER

As of Sunday May 1, Canon Izzo has assumed the



responsibilities of Canon to the Ordinary and Transitions Officer. I am grateful that Acting Transition Officer Rhonda Jackson, who has served us all faithfully and well for the past year, will continue in her role during the month of May to help bring Canon Izzo on-board and to assure a

smooth and orderly handover of all open processes. Effective June 1, Rev. Izzo will assume full responsibilities for both the Canon to the Ordinary and Transitions Officer positions.

Canon Izzo's expertise and experience have already served us well in the Diocese of New Jersey. Since 2016, she has worked as special consultant at my request to address a variety of challenging vestry/clergy/congregational matters within the diocese. A graduate of Fordham University, Canon Izzo has earned an M.SW. in Clinical Social Work from New York University in 1990, a Master of Divinity/Theology from St. John's University in 2000 and Master of Sacred Theology from The General Theological Seminary in 2014. She was ordained a priest in the Episcopal Church by the Rt. Rev A. M. Dietsche bishop of New York in 2014. She brings to the Diocese of New Jersey impeccable credentials, a passion to serve the people of God, and a deep love of Jesus.

Prior to her ordination Canon Izzo was employed for nearly 20 years in a VA health care setting as a licensed psychotherapist specializing in trauma. She was also clinical supervisor and coordinator of their graduate training program. In her role as clinical supervisor, she exercised managerial tasks and visionary leadership promoting adaptive change during transitions, as well as addressing workplace disputes and resolution.

In her ordained ministry she has served racially and ethnically diverse family, pastoral, and program size congregations in New York and Long Island. These have included both urban and suburban settings. She has experience with multi-ethnic, multi-lingual congregations having once served an Anglo-Latino congregation that successfully became one congregation with two languages. Together, the members of this united congregation engaged in a passionate joint ministry, serving children who had crossed the southern border and were relocated to the New York region for 30 days.

Canon Izzo is a certified Interim Minister having trained with The Rev. Dr. Rob Voyle, Director of the highly regarded Clergy Leadership Institute. At his invitation, Canon Izzo coled a "one year just in time" clergy consultation group. While in the Diocese of New York she convened a group of clergy and lay representatives of six congregations to address racism in the wider community. This group continues to serve the community to the present day. She has served on the Anti-Racism Committee in the Diocese of New York. Having received training through the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center, she has been engaged as a consultant in different church contexts to: work with parties in conflict and help resolve them; effect reconciliation in imperiled pastoral relationships; help the healing process in churches whose clergy engaged in "conduct unbecoming a clergy person."

Canon Izzo has facilitated leadership and strategic planning processes in the Episcopal Dioceses of New York, Long Island, New Jersey and Pennsylvania and has has trained facilitators in the Dioceses of New York and Long Island to be transition process leaders and facilitators of mutual ministry review processes. She initiated "Company of Preachers"- a women clergy group who gather weekly and work together in sermon preparation for the upcoming Sunday.

Canon Izzo comes to the Diocese of New Jersey with a desire to support the formation and growth of disciples, and a commitment to be an active and supportive presence for clergy and congregations in transitions. A native Brooklynite, she values relationships, is a champion of the mercy of God revealed in reconciliation and healing, and delights in how the Holy Spirit makes matches between clergy and congregations in transition. As she states herself, she is "in awe of how the Spirit grows the faith community through the mutual ministry of clergy and congregation." Her approach to ministry is informed by a contemplative stance of listening, observing, being curious and asking questions.

I hope you recognize with me that we are blessed to have this extraordinarily qualified and gifted person to serve us during this time of episcopal transition.

As we listened, it was clear these concerns had merit and we took extraordinary steps to bring about the re-incorporation of this combined position into both our thinking and into the budget. Combining the positions is necessitated by budgetary considerations. That Canon Izzo is willing to work with us with the understanding that her position is only guaranteed through the first six months of the next bishop's episcopate is a tremendously gracious gift to me and to us all. It is also a gift to the next bishop.



Rhonda Jackson, Acting Transition Ministry Officer

I am overflowing with thankfulness for Rhonda Jackson and the service she has rendered to us all in the diocese. When Canon Brian Jemmott began his medical leave, I asked Rhonda to take on the temporary position of Acting Transitions Officer. She had been serving as one of our Transition Consultants (those who work one-on-one with congregations during times of transition) for a few years. She had also been working with Canon Rob Droste as part of his Coaching Network.

Even with all this, she had a steep learning curve. Rhonda mastered this and quickly became highly

proficient. Moreover, as the length of time she would serve in this capacity kept stretching on without a clear sense of when it would end, Rhonda was gracious and kept on

working. Across the diocese many have shared with me their gratitude and expressed how much they have enjoyed working with Rhonda. I am grateful for the professionalism and care she has shown to the congregations and people she has worked with as well as for her conscientiousness as a member of diocesan staff.

During the month of May, Rhonda will be handing over the transition side of the position, including all open processes, to Canon Izzo and will step down at the end of the month. Please join me in giving thanks for all Rhonda has done in service to Christ and our ministry together in the diocese and hold her in your prayers as she discerns how God is calling her to use her many and clear gifts for ministry.

This Eastertide, we all have much for which our thankfulness should be overflowing. May God continue to bless us, guide us, and lead us along the way as we celebrate the risen Christ. Alleluia!
